Hi Guys,



Rita Hayworth was born Margarita Cansino in New York on 17th October 1918. Her father, Eduardo Cansino, was a celebrated Spanish dancer and her other, Volga Hayworth, a Ziegfeld Follies Showgirl.

The family settled in California in 1927 where Eduardo opened a dancing school. When the great depression of 1929 hit he was forced to close down the school and took work as a dancer in nightclubs, south of the border, using his young teenager daughter, Rita, as his dancing partner.

In 1934, a Hollywood agent for Fox Studios spotted Rita at "Aqua Caliente" in Tijuana and offered her a film contract. Under the name of Rita Cansino she starred in a swag of B movies for different studios before Columbia Pictures picked her up, changed her name to Rita Hayworth, then loaned hr back to her original studio, Fox Studios, to act with screen legend, Tyrone Power, and famous actress Linda Darnel, in the screen epic "Blood and Sand".

Rita was given third billing but actually stole the picture as a Femme Fattale. It was at this point in time that Rita became a Star. A lot of musicals followed, two with Fred Astaire, "You'll Never Get Rich" and "You Were Never Lovelier". The musical score was by Cole Porter and the next was another musical with the great Gene Kelly, titled "Cover Girl". Years later when interviewed, Fred Astaire said of Rita "She was the best dancing partner I had ever had".

From 1941 to 1945 the world was at war. According to a Hollywood popularity poll Bette Gable and Rita Hayworth were voted the servicemen's favourite Pin-Up Girls. In 1946 the film "Gilda" capitulated Rita to the top of Hollywood stardom and made her the leading actress of that era. She was given the label "The Love Goddess". She had become the most beautiful, desirable female actress on the screen and the heartthrob of millions of moviegoers worlds wide. People actually thought of Rita as Gilda, which was very far from the truth, how could any woman ever hold up to that image?

Rita, in reality, was a simple woman with very down to earth ideas. She had a full on private life with five different husbands that made the headlines as regularly as her films did. Her husbands, apart from the first husband (Ed Judson) were all men of influence and included film making genius Orson Wells (1943—1947), next was well known Muslim, Prince Ali Khan (1949—1951, then singer Dick Haymes (1953—1955) and finally film producer James Hill (1958—1961). It seems that as hard as she tried to find a compatible partner, none of these men she married could bring her true happiness, although her children from her marriages, daughters Rebecca Wells and Princess Yasmin Khan made up for what her husbands failed to do so.

In the 70s Rita's behaviour started to become strange, and she was found to have early stages of Alzheimer's disease.

From 1980 to 1987 Rita was cared for by private nurses and daughter, Yasmin, in the Penthouse apartment in New York.

On 14th May 1987 Rita lost her battle with her illness and passed away peacefully. Rita made over 60 films, some of the best being 'Blood and Sand', 'You Were Never Lovelier', 'Cover Girl', 'Gilda', 'Loves of Carmen', 'Affaire in Trinidad', 'Salome', 'Miss Sadie Thompson', 'Pal Joey 'and 'Separate Tables.'

An actress of Rita' calibre doesn't exist anymore, unfortunately.
Rita was a classic beauty, glamorous, talented and above
all oozed class!!

Today there are many Gay social groups in many parts of Australia. One of the oldest is Country Network. Founded in 1977 in Dubbo NSW to foster contact and friendship among gay and lesbian people living in rural and remote Australia, it aims to help overcome social isolation and homophobic

discrimination often experienced in small communities. By the late 80's with membership growing, the group became Australia wide.

Membership peaked in the mid 90's with most members located in state capital cities and larger regional towns and cities throughout Australia.

Most social activity, including BBQ's, trips to various places of interest, cultural activities, theatres, and many others are state, regional centre or city based. A calendar of events is published for all members and friends. Twice a year, Members from all over Australia gather together, every Spring - in a different capital city - and every Autumn - in a different State's regional area for the half yearly 'Corroboree'.

These main gatherings of most members are always hugely successful.

Member "Networking" is also via our confidential membership list together with the monthly newsletter where all the future and latest events (and perhaps a little bit of gossip!) can be found.

The groups website enables easy and private contact with other members together with details of all functions and activities across the nation.

One of the strongest traditions of Country Network is offering hospitality to other members. Indeed, welcoming visitors to your region and helping them enjoy their visit is perhaps the most important thing we can do to further the principle aims of the club. Commonly members are welcomed into other members homes during their visits.

Country Network presently has around 200 members across every capital city and many major regions including Australia's red centre. New members are welcome, particularly those from rural and remote country areas where access to social contact with other gay people can be limited. Country Network's success can be measured over many years by the number of strong and lasting friendships formed.

If you would like to meet other like-minded gay people for friendship and social activities, or you feel you have something to offer those that do, then Country Network is for you.
